First up, the most magnificent art gallery from Dakota, Freya, Lana, Megan, Zofia, Marcus and Sophie:


















We are looking for proactive young people to create unique and innovative ideas that follow new social distancing rules so that young and old can meet safely in a post COVID-19 world.

Perhaps it is a play structure, a two-way chair or even an exciting game? Wherever your inventiveness takes you, this is your chance to create something new and imaginative that could genuinely make a difference to the people involved and to your local community.

And through this open-innovation challenge, we can help you turn your idea into reality.

Winners will work with industry experts, mentors and potentially even manufacturers and investors to get their idea into the marketplace, gaining invaluable experience as well as a £250 cash prize!

Entrants simply submit drawings, renders or 3D models together with a short statement of less than 200 words explaining their ideas, possible materials, budgetary costs and how / where you see it being used for example care homes, hospitals, hospices, workplaces, playgrounds, parks and other public spaces. We also want entrants to tell us what difference their idea will make to their local community.

This competition is open to anyone and everyone who has an interest in design, small spaces, interiors or solving this urgent social challenge.

I know how much talent there is for this sort of design and technology work in our Noadswood family, so what are you waiting for? Get thinking and get designing. You've got just under a couple of weeks to turn an idea into a brilliant entry - the competition closes on Friday 19th June.
