



RISK ASSESSMENT – Post Step 4: September 2021 UPDATE

Key Guidance has changed post Step 4 – the documentation below is the Noadswood unified risk assessment, including the key flow chart diagrams to be followed.

NHS Test and Trace will identify close contacts (and Noadswood will assist with this using our seating plans / identifying with the student who they believe they were with, as well as being informed by students / parents and guardians if they believe they themselves were a close contact (via health@noadswood.hants.sch.uk)).


Students identified as close contacts, who remain symptomless, will not need to self-isolate or book a PCR test.

Instead, these students will be supplied with extra lateral flow test kits, and these should be used each evening for **10 days from the first day of being identified as a close contact**. We will also inform our Noadswood community of the positive case and would ask all members of our community
to be vigilant, being aware of the key symptoms of Covid-19.


*If students begin to show symptoms, self-isolation must occur, and a PCR test booked.

*This applies to staff too, who are fully vaccinated.

Adults: Self Isolation

When do I need to self-isolate?

You need to self-isolate for 10 days if you:

- test positive for Covid-19 or start showing symptoms
- are an adult who has not been fully vaccinated, and you are identified by contact tracers as a close contact of someone who has tested positive
- are an adult who lives with someone who tests positive (or has Covid symptoms) and you are not fully vaccinated
- · arrive in the UK from a red list country
- are an adult who has not been fully vaccinated and you arrive in the UK from an **amber list country**

RAG rated control measures below:

Students and staff will be offered weekly lateral flow tests and will be expected to carry these out. If the result is positive the individual will be requested not to attend Noadswood and book a PCR test, returning only if this is negative.

First Aid and Coronavirus management

When administering first aid or supporting a child with a medical condition, please follow the guidance below: Treating pupils and staff

- 1. Please continue to keep a 2M distance from pupils and staff where possible
- 2. If a child is injured or unwell while in school and needs direct personal care please keep contact to a minimum and wash your hands prior and after to contact with the child
- 3. If staff or pupils develop coronavirus symptoms while at school they must be sent home. Symptoms:
 - a new continuous cough
 - a high temperature
 - a loss of, or change in, your normal sense of taste or smell
- 4. If a pupil becomes unwell with symptoms of coronavirus while in school and needs direct personal care until they can return home a fluid-resistant face mask should be worn by the supervising adult <u>and the pupil</u> if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained. If contact with the child or young person is necessary, then disposable gloves, a disposable apron and a fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult. If a risk assessment determines that there is a risk of splashing to the eyes, for example from coughing, spitting, or vomiting, then eye protection should also be worn.
- 5. Supervise the pupil in a space ventilated and isolated from others e.g. medical room
- 6. Notify SLT member on call asap
- 7. Notify site team

<u>Instructions for donning full PPE:</u>

- 1. Wash your hands
- 2. Put on PPE (in any order)
- 3. Do not touch your face whilst wearing PPE
- 4. Remove all PPE and place in a bin, remove gloves last
- 5. Wash your hands again

CPR:

- 1. Call 999 immediately tell the call handler if the patient has any COVID-19 symptoms
- 2. Ask for help. If a portable defibrillator is available, ask for it
- 3. Before starting CPR, to minimise transmission risk, use a cloth or towel to cover the patient's mouth and nose, while still permitting breathing to restart following successful resuscitation
- 4. Use the full PPE:

Disposable gloves

Disposable apron

Fluid-resistant surgical face mask

Eye protection (visor or goggles)

DFE Guidance

DfE guidance is that the wearing of a face covering or face mask in schools is not necessary.

Noadswood provision of face coverings

We are making face shields available to staff and pupils who would nonetheless wish to wear a face covering. Each person will be offered a face shield and they have the choice to accept it and wear it. They should be cleaned daily by the wearer or parent with a normal household cleaner and cloth.

The face shields issued are re-usable by each individual wearer and are the face coverings we would like to encourage for pupils in school for those who wish to wear it at this time and pending any revised medical or health and safety guidance. *

Replacement face shields for pupils are available to purchase directly from New Forest Signs for £6.80.

Face covering should cover your mouth and nose while allowing you to breathe comfortably. It is important to wash your hands before putting them on and after taking it off.

PPE for personal care and first aid

The majority of staff in education settings will not require PPE beyond what they would normally need for their work, even if they are not always able to maintain a distance of 2 metres from others. PPE is only needed in a very small number of cases including:

- pupils whose care routinely already involves the use of PPE due to their intimate care needs should continue to receive their care in the same way
- if a pupil becomes unwell with symptoms of coronavirus (COVID-19) while in school and needs direct personal care until they can return home. A fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult if a distance of 2 metres cannot be maintained. If contact with the pupil is necessary, then disposable gloves, a disposable apron and a fluid-resistant surgical face mask should be worn by the supervising adult. If a risk assessment determines that there is a risk of splashing to the eyes, for example from coughing, spitting, or vomiting, then eye protection should also be worn

Instructions for donning full PPE:

- 1. Wash your hands
- 2. Put on PPE (in any order)
- 3. Do not touch your face whilst wearing PPE
- 4. Remove all PPE and place in a bin, remove gloves last
- 5. Wash your hands again

Public transport and contracted home to school transport

Passengers travelling on public transport should wear a face covering Contracted home to school transport:

- 1. Both drivers and escorts should wear face coverings.
- 2. Secondary age children and their parents may wish to use a face covering, there is published advice that applies to using public transport that they can use if they wish to, https://www.gov.uk/guidance/coronavirus-covid-19-safer-travel-guidance-for-passengers
 *Face coverings (or any form of medical mask unless instructed to be used for specific clinical reasons) should not be worn by those who may not be able to handle them as directed (for example, those with special educational needs) as it may inadvertently increase the risk of transmission.

This guidance will be regularly reviewed in line with guidance from Public Health England and the DfE.

PPE and Enhanced Cleaning Plan

PPE

Face coverings

- **Disposable face masks** - available for staff carrying out personal care for students or providing medical assistance.

For replenishment: Ticket to facility team

- Washable face masks for staff – available for all staff who require one. Please limit to one per person. Includes masks with transparent mouth area.

To request a mask – Ticket to facility team

- Visors (plastic face shields) for staff - available for all staff who require one. Please limit to one per person

To request a mask – Ticket to facility team

- Washable face masks for students - available for all students who require one. Please limit to one per person. Includes masks with transparent mouth area.

To request a mask – Request via House Leaders

- Visors (plastic face shields) for students - available for all students who require one. Please limit to one per person

To request a mask – Request via House Leaders

Gloves

- **Disposable Gloves** - available to all staff. They will be provided and replenished in key areas e.g. classrooms.

To request gloves – Ticket to facility team or ask a janitor

Aprons

- **Disposable aprons** - available for staff carrying out personal care for students or providing medical assistance.

For replenishment: Ticket to facility team

CLEANING

Touch-point cleaning

Touch-points around school will be cleaned more regularly than before. They will be cleaned using an anti-viral solution with the cloths rinsed very frequently, also in anti-viral solution. Cloths will be cleaned daily.

General classroom cleaning

Desks will be cleaned with an everyday cleaning product and then wiped over with anti-viral solution. Cloths will be rinsed very frequently and washed daily.

Anti-viral wipes - staff

Wipes, whilst our current stock remains, will be made available in all spaces around school. Please use them as you require. Please avoid contact with eyes. The wipes are gentle but can be drying. Those with sensitive skin are advised to moisturise their hands regularly.

You do not need to wear gloves unless using the wipes often or for a prolonged period of time. Gloves are available via facility team.

For replenishment: Ticket to facility team. Please avoid moving wipes between rooms.

Anti-viral solution - staff

PE and Technology have been provided with Selgiene for cleaning equipment after use. Please keep out of the reach of children. Please use the cloths provided and these will be cleaned for you. You need to wear gloves when using this product and these will be provided. The 5L refill bottle is highly concentrated. Please dilute per the instructions on the bottle. Please keep out of reach of children.

Selgiene should only be used by staff using gloves and not used by students

Other departments may continue to use the cleaning products they would normally use. Green cloths have been provided and will be washed daily by the facilities team

IT equipment cleaning

Keyboards and mice can be cleaned using the wipes which are gentle but should be kept away from eyes. Please supervise the use of wipes if students request. The wipes are gentle but can be drying. Those with sensitive skin are advised to moisturise their hands regularly. Parents of pupils with very sensitive skin e.g. severe eczema should notify the school if they are not comfortable with their child using wipes. We do have small disposable gloves available.

Office cleaning

Offices will be cleaned every Friday or Saturday.

Desks will be cleaned with an everyday cleaning product and then wiped over with anti-viral solution.

Cloths will be rinsed very frequently and washed daily.

Staff chairs

In shared spaces, staff have the option of using a fabric or plastic chair. Either option should be wiped down with an anti-viral wipe prior to use.

Litter Picking

Litter-picking will continue to be provided by our cleaning company this academic year. It is more important than ever to encourage students to clear up after themselves to avoid staff and students having to handle litter.

HAND HYGIENE

Hand wash stations

We have installed 6 hand wash stations. One in the medical room, two in the upper science lobby and three in the small dining hall. These are foot-activated and supply hot water in short bursts. These are for staff and students to use as they require. If you notice any problems with a unit please notify facility team.

Hand sanitiser

- **Entry points** Hand sanitiser is available in wall-mounted pumps at every entry point to the school. These contain an alcohol-based sanitiser. Units are also positioned around the school in key locations.
- Classrooms Hand sanitiser will be available in all classrooms. In Science and Technology hand sanitiser dispensers will contain an alcohol-free sanitiser that is still a confirmed viruside.

As with alcohol wipes, this product is gentle on the skin. However, anyone with particularly sensitive skin is encouraged to bring in their own sanitiser that they are comfortable with. Those with sensitive skin may benefit from additional use of moisturiser.

Behaviour

Risk:

We know that this is going to be a challenging time for students as they return to school and it is important that all students fully understand the expectations of their conduct and behaviour as listed in this document. There is, of course, a potential that some of our students may not conduct themselves in a way that is either safe or appropriate for themselves, other students and our staff and thereby risk the safety of themselves and others, as well as disrupt such important learning time.


We would ask that staff recognise that these are extraordinary circumstances for students and they may first need gentle reminders giving absolute clarity of behavioural expectations particularly surrounding social distancing. We ask that staff continue to use the usual 'Pivotal' language and approach with our students, giving them every chance to be successful with their learning, safety and behaviour. However, we absolutely will not tolerate continued unsafe or poor behaviour from any student in school.

Control Measures:

If a student behaves in a way that is neither appropriate or safe and they have been reminded of the expectations but continue to display said behaviours, we ask that colleagues email startrekking and ask for assistance. Our normal behavioural expectations and procedures are in place.

Use of toilets in school - students

The toilets will be cleaned thoroughly after school – students have designated toilets to reduce mixing of bubbles, shown below



One Way System

The one way system is operating to ease the flow of people around the site and minimise bottlenecks which will increase the amount of time people and in close contact with one another. This, along with the staggered timetable for different years should reduce the quantity of people in any one area.
